Planning applications

In the fourth quarter of 2006, district planning authorities in England received 149 thousand applications for planning permission (Table 1); an increase of 1 per cent compared with the corresponding quarter in 2005. The largest increase in the number of planning applications received was in the South West and West Midlands (both 3 per cent). Other increases were in London and the South East (both 2 per cent). There were decreases in the number of planning applications received in East Midlands (-2 per

cent) and North West (-1 per cent). **Planning decisions**

District planning authorities decided 141 thousand planning applications in the fourth quarter of 2006; 1 per cent lower than the same quarter last year. The largest decrease in the number of planning applications determined was in East Midlands (5 per cent); others were in the North West, Yorkshire and the Humber and West Midlands (all 3 per cent). However, the number of planning applications determined in London increased by 3 per cent and North East by 1 per cent when com-

p ared with the same quarter last year. Householder decisions increased by 1 per cent from 69,400 to 70,400 and accounted for 50 per cent of all decisions. Decisions on dwelling applications, for both major and minor developments decreased from 20,000 to 18,300 and accounted for 13 per cent of the total.

Applications granted

82 per cent of all decisions in the fourth quarter of 2006 were granted; no change when compared with the same period in 2005. Approval rates across the regions ranged from 76 per cent in London to

90 per cent in the North East.

Speed of decision

October In to December 2006 district authorities, on average, determined 70 per cent of major applications within 13 weeks, 75 per cent of minor applications within 8 weeks, and 87 per cent of other applications within 8 weeks. This represents a 4 percentage point improvement in determining major applications when compared with the corresponding quarter a year ago. The figures remain unchanged for minor and other applications.

Also, in October to December 2006, 268 authorities (73 per cent of all authorities) made at least 60 per cent of their decisions on major applications within the 13 week period; 318 authorities (86 per cent) made at least 65 per cent of their

decisions on minor applications within the statutory 8 week period; and 323 authorities (88 per cent) made at least 80 per cent of their decisions on other applications within the statutory 8 week period. The number of authorities meeting the performance target in October to December 2006 compared with performance in the same quarter a year ago, represents a 10 percentage point improvement on major applications, a 1 percentage point improvement on minor applications and a 4 percentage point improvement on other applications.

In the year-ending December 2006, the proportion of authorities meeting the target on majors is 80 per cent; this is a 19 percentage point increase (296 authorities compared to 223) compared with the year-ending December 2005 figure. For minors, the actual performance is 89 per cent; an 8 percentage point increase (328 authorities compared to 296) whilst for others, actual performance is now 90 per cent; an increase of 5 percentage points (331 authorities compared to 309).
